

I have just read the Rule of St. Benedict, to my shame for the first time. It is a monastic rule from the 6th century that sets out the disciplines and structures for the effective running of a monastery. The rules of poverty, chastity and obedience are highly restrictive; the punishments for violations severe; the lifestyle highly demanding. Praying at set offices eight times a day (including at 2 in the morning) meant that the monk would rarely get more than few hours of unbroken sleep. Central heating was for wimps and the diet uninspiring. Although eased in later centuries, it has been the basis for the monastic tradition in Western Europe ever since. Its not the sort of discipline that works in everyday life, but that doesn't mean it has no value. It is designed to foster Christian virtues of humility, and obedience (albeit expressed through submission to the Abbot), and a growing Christlikeness.

Most of March will be the season of Lent, when we Christians have traditionally given up things that give us pleasure to focus on our spiritual journey. As our world has changed it seems increasingly anachronistic. Our culture screams at us from the lifestyle sections that the way to real fulfilment is getting what you really desire. The idea that giving something up might be good for you, other than as a grudging acknowledgement of post-Christmas weight gain, is anathema. Consumerism works by creating desire and then offering to fulfil it. But our strongest desires are not necessarily our deepest ones. Giving things up, or fasting can get us in touch with these deeper desires that only God can satisfy. There is evidence that restricting calories by intermittent fasting or turning our mobiles off is actually good for us physically and psychologically. A good lent can be like leaving the Christmas presents unopened under the tree until Christmas day. There is a joy in the opening that is enhanced by the waiting. So, as well as helping us grow closer to God, our Lenten restraint can amplify the joy of Christ risen when we get to that glorious Easter celebration. I once gave up tea and coffee for lent and had my first large cup on Easter morning. Before I knew it, I'd done three services and built a compost heap! Lent can be spiritual dvnamite.

Clergy Thoughts

Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy. For six days you shall labour and do all your work. But the seventh day is a sabbath to the Lord your God; you shall not do any work.

(Exodus 20:8-10)

I suppose we all have our secrets. My guilty secret – well one of them, some I am not about to admit to – is an addiction to *Last of the Summer Wine*, as some of you will know from the many quotes I have used in sermons over the years. My son dismisses this as eccentricity, if not senility, and says it is always about someone going down a hill in a bath. Having watched every episode many times I can categorically state that that only happened once – though admittedly there were several crazy hill descents in other weird "vehicles."

But when I began training for ministry, I found some vindication in discovering that my college principal was also a fan. In fact, he found it quite theological; he said it was all about Sabbath. I wish now I had asked him to expand his theory a little more, but it is a thought I have returned to many times over the years. Here are three redundant, later OAP, men in the final stage of life who are no longer at work – not that Compo ever was – are free from all commitments and can spend all day, every day, just wandering the beautiful Yorkshire countryside, sleeping in the heather, enjoying the odd pint and – yes – indulging in some very daft exploits. And why not? They are in fact, having done with their labours, now resting in an extended Sabbath.

Now, I am not a Sunday observance obsessive. I have been known to nip to the shop in an emergency – admittedly caused by my poor foresight; and I used to take a Sunday paper, until I realised that I never had time to read it. (I always thought that an anomaly anyway; surely purists should rather be eschewing the Monday paper which is produced on Sunday.) But we are not talking about pettifogging rules as the Pharisees were so fond of doing. Sabbath is an altogether greater concept. And as Jesus told us, "The Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath." (Mark 2:27) It was God's way of ensuring that humans – and not just humans but every part of his creation including working animals - had a period of rest and recreation: a time when the demands of earning a living could be put to one side and we could simply be ourselves, take our leisure and enjoy our environment. That would allow time for both physical and spiritual revival – and it would be a holy time – the Sabbath to the Lord your God.

In our present age, when the wheels of commerce never seem to stop turning, it is increasingly important to hold on to that spirit of Sabbath and remember its true purpose. It is after all one of the Ten Commandments, so important enough to be part of what we might consider to be God's primary manifesto. God commanded it not because he wanted to give us an additional burden but so that we might actually *enjoy* our Sabbath. What Puritans over the centuries seem to have forgotten is that it is work that is forbidden on the Sabbath – not pleasure. And, yes, we should also use the Sabbath for worship – but it doesn't mean that worship too cannot be a pleasure. It is certainly part of that re-creative process. Isaiah told us to "call the Sabbath a delight." (Isaiah 58:13) May all your Sabbaths, long or short, be as delightful as God intended that they should be!


