The Church at Monkhopton was always beautifully decorated for all festivals.

One Festival which stands out in my mind was Easter. - the flowers were so beautiful and smelled so nice - the services were always well attended. I liked to see whole families at Church on Sunday mornings.

Sunday, in those days was observed as a day of rest.

On Sunday morning we went to Sunday School and always to Church for evening service which was always very cheerful.

I am sure I had a very happy childhood and was very sorry to leave School.

At the end of 1918 times were very bad as Spanish `Flu struck the Country and many thousands died.

I must say Monkhopton was very lucky only having a few mild cases. In Bridgnorth and the Corvedale the situation was much more serious.

Hello once again from the Morville School family.

Hasn't it been wonderful to see the glimmers of sunshine and slightly lighter nights beginning to creep in. It truly feels like Spring is arriving, especially with the daffodils and crocuses beginning to pop up.

In Oak Tree Class the children had a wonderful time being Museum curators at the end of last half term. The children took great pride in showing both their peers from across the school and their own parents/ carers around their very own class toy museum. The children could describe and discuss the toys from the different eras and could confidently compare and contrast them. This half term the children will be delving into the wonders of Shanghai as they kick start their topic of 'We're off to Great Places' with an exploration of the traditions and customs linked to Chinese New Year.

In Birch Tree Class the children found dragon eggs last half term in the forest schools and were even more shocked when the eggs then appeared in their classroom. This was a wonderful provocation for their independent story writing in class. Miss Owen was amazed by some of the wonderful vocabulary and plot lines created by our very imaginative children. This half term the children will be travelling through time with the class book of Major Glad and Major Dizzy by Jan Oke. The story is based on the true discovery of a hidden hoard of Victorian toys under the author's floor. This will also introduce some of the milestones of recent British history.

In Chestnut Tree Class the children will be building on their learning about Isambard Kingdom Brunel and his work on bridges. They will begin by learning about building strong structures and how different shapes affect a structure. The children will then go on to design and make truss bridges, first testing their designs using spaghetti then evaluating and reinforcing them. The children will then construct their final designs in wood using saws and other tools. Finally, they will evaluate our finished bridges against our design specification before sharing with parents and carers.

Although this, once again, is only a short half term we will also be hoping to take part in many other special events and days including;

Bishop's Letter

I have just read the Rule of St. Benedict, to my shame for the first time. It is a monastic rule from the 6th century that sets out the disciplines and structures for the effective running of a monastery. The rules of poverty, chastity and obedience are highly restrictive; the punishments for violations severe; the lifestyle highly demanding. Praying at set offices eight times a day (including at 2 in the morning) meant that the monk would rarely get more than few hours of unbroken sleep. Central heating was for wimps and the diet uninspiring. Although eased in later centuries, it has been the basis for the monastic tradition in Western Europe ever since. It's not the sort of discipline that works in everyday life, but that doesn't mean it has no value. It is designed to foster Christian virtues of humility, and obedience (albeit expressed through submission to the Abbot), and a growing Christlikeness.

Most of March will be the season of Lent, when we Christians have traditionally given up things that give us pleasure to focus on our spiritual journey. As our world has changed it seems increasingly anachronistic. Our culture screams at us from the lifestyle sections that the way to real fulfilment is getting what you really desire. The idea that giving something up might be good for you, other than as a grudging acknowledgement of post-Christmas weight gain, is anathema. Consumerism works by creating desire and then offering to fulfil it. But our strongest desires are not necessarily our deepest ones. Giving things up, or fasting can get us in touch with these deeper desires that only God can satisfy. There is evidence that restricting calories by intermittent fasting or turning our mobiles off is actually good for us physically and psychologically. A good Lent can be like leaving the Christmas presents unopened under the tree until Christmas day. There is a joy in the opening that is enhanced by the waiting. So, as well as helping us grow closer to God, our Lenten restraint can amplify the joy of Christ risen when we get to that glorious Easter celebration. I once gave up tea and coffee for Lent and had my first large cup on Easter morning. Before I knew it, I'd done three services and built a compost heap! Lent can be spiritual dynamite.
