Letting the Light in

Spring does not arrive cleanly or all at once. It comes slowly and unevenly. The sounds of returning birds herald warmer weather, green shoots appear before the cold has fully released its hold. Even as the days lengthen, winter often still lingers. Spring understands something that faith has always known: that renewal is rarely quick, and almost never comfortable.

For me, spring is forever bound to the weeks I spent sitting beside my mother as she was dying. It was a season of watching and waiting. In her final days, nights seemed to stretch without end. At around four in the morning, birds would begin to sing outside her hospital window. Their sound floated into the room as we kept watch, fragile and persistent. Slowly the sky would lighten. Family would arrive. Nurses would come in with their laughter, their friendship, their quiet competence. Little by little, the weight of the night would begin to lift, and the light broke in.

The morning my mother died, a dove cooed outside the window. It was an ordinary sound, easily overlooked, but it felt like a sign: God, by his Holy Spirit, had seen us, and God was present within it all. The following day, the weather broke into full spring sunshine. Within days, the trees burst into leaf, bright and astonishingly green. Amidst grief and deep tiredness, life was continuing to unfold, and beauty was to be found everywhere, and yet still, for many months, it was hard to worship, hard to pray and hard to hear God's voice.

The Biblical story never pretends that light appears without darkness first. As we read the Christmas story in the depths of the British winter, Luke is careful not to place God's arrival in ideal conditions, but in a world shaped by political pressure, anxiety, grief, and ordinary hardship. God's work of revealing himself does not begin with triumph or glory, but with quiet presence in tumultuous circumstances.

Many of us recognise that pattern in our own lives. We wait for things to feel resolved before we allow ourselves to hope. We tell ourselves that joy can come later, once the worry has passed or the loss has softened. That we'll return to church when the kids are older, or pray again when God isn't so mad about our bad choices. But Luke offers a different picture. Light appears while things are imperfect and unfinished, and bringing all that mess into the light is what makes it easier to bear.

Spring often teaches the same lesson. It does not begin when the ground is warm, but when it is just beginning to thaw. The first signs of life are fragile and (like the camelia in my garden) sometimes thwarted on a first attempt at breakthrough. We might spot a single bud on a bare branch or daffodils appearing in Tesco. These are not signs that winter is finished, but reminders that its days are numbered. Spring has broken into the harshness of winter despite the most unfavourable conditions.

This is not a dramatic kind of hope. It does not erase grief or hurry us toward resolution. Instead, it sits alongside what is unfinished. Luke shows us a God who enters the ordinary: long journeys, crowded spaces, tired bodies, uncertain futures. Light does not come to deny reality, but to dwell within it.

As spring reaches its fullness, it reminds us that light works patiently. Each day grows brighter and longer almost without us noticing. Growth happens slowly and quietly. Faith, too, is less about sudden certainty and more about learning to trust the small signs of presence along the way.

Luke's Gospel invites us to pay attention to where light has already begun to show itself, and to embrace it wholeheartedly, no matter how unfavourable the conditions of life. Because, like the signs of spring in the dark of winter, God is here in the world and breaking into even the bleakest of circumstances. This hope is not sentimental optimism, but learning to recognise the presence of God with us, and gently making space again for him to meet us.

Clergy Thoughts

Lent: Learning to Walk Back to the Heart of God

Lent arrives quietly, like a change in the light. The days are not suddenly brighter or warmer, but something is shifting beneath the surface. In the Church, this season invites us to notice that shift in our own hearts—to pause, to reflect, and to turn again toward God.

At its core, Lent is about returning. We return to prayer when our lives have become too noisy. We return to fasting when we have filled ourselves with things that never quite satisfy. We return to generosity when we have grown comfortable or self-focused. These practices are not meant to make us feel guilty or deprived. They are meant to make us free.

So often, we rush through life measuring success by what we accumulate: achievements, possessions, approval. Lent gently interrupts that story. It asks us to let go of what clutters our souls so we can make room for what truly matters. In giving something up, we discover what we have been holding onto too tightly. In taking something on—extra prayer, acts of kindness, time with Scripture—we discover how deeply God longs to meet us.

The journey of Lent mirrors Jesus' own journey into the wilderness. He did not go there to escape the world, but to face it honestly, grounded in the love of the Father. In the quiet and the hunger, he was reminded of who he was. Lent offers us that same invitation: to remember who we are—not defined by our failures or fears, but by God's faithful love.

As we walk toward Easter, Lent teaches us that transformation does not happen all at once. It happens in small, faithful steps: choosing patience over anger, silence over distraction, generosity over comfort. These choices shape us slowly, making our hearts more open to grace.

A Prayer:

Loving God,
as we journey through this season of Lent, quiet our hearts and clear our vision.

Help us to release whatever draws us away from you,
and to take up whatever leads us closer to your love.

Walk with us through every desert and every doubt, and renew us with your grace, so that we may greet Easter with grateful and transformed hearts.

A farewell message from Archdeacon Fiona

Five years ago, my husband and I packed up our worldly goods (with the help of a team from the removals company, thankfully!) and headed west for a place we didn't know, answering God's call for me to come and be the Archdeacon of Ludlow.

Now, unbelievably, it's time for us to be packing up again and heading south, once more in answer to God's clear call.

To say I've loved being your Archdeacon would be an understatement. There have been challenges and tough moments, of course, but that's true of every role in every church anywhere in the world. You took me to your hearts, and I hope you know it was reciprocated. I've learned so much from the clergy and laity of this diocese, as well as from Bishop Richard, Archdeacon Derek, and my colleagues in the Diocesan Office and the Bishop's Office. Those lessons have changed me and shaped me, and I shall take them with me to the Diocese of Bath & Wells.

It seems wrong to single places out, because so much of what makes this diocese special isn't the huge, grand places and experiences, but the small, often hidden, very real, unfussy, day-to-day worship and witness of faithful communities in the Borderlands.

So as I move from a place I've come to love, to head out once more following God, what would I want to leave you with, to ponder and pray as you go forward?

First, remember that faithfully doing “the old things”, like Sunday worship, pastoral care, schools work, harvest, remembrance, Christmas and Easter, especially in our deeply rural communities, is a highly effective way of sharing our faith. In our diocese, we see and show that ‘ordinary’ ministry, done well, carried out in humility, dependent on God, bathed in prayer and offered with all the grace and energy we can give, bears fruit in season.

Second, and in contrast, be ready to move when God calls. Doing the “old things” doesn’t always mean doing them in the old ways. Many of our projects, which complement parish ministry, are seeking to do the “old things” in new ways to reach new generations. Millennials, Gen Z, and Gen Alpha need to hear the unchanging truths of the faith, but we will need to tell them in new ways. That may be uncomfortable for us, but as I’ve often said to those who long for things to go ‘back to normal’: which normal? The normal of 5 years ago? 50 years ago? 500 years ago? Because none of those ‘normals’ were the same. As I’ve declared many a time, we’re not the National Trust with hymns, we’re part of the living church of Jesus Christ, and if we’re to bring the gospel to a world facing political turmoil, climate change, and the AI revolution we’re going to need to change the way we do all sorts of things, without changing the heart of the message. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever, but the Church of Jesus Christ is a pilgrim people moving towards the renewal of all things at his return. Finally, keep on keeping on. There’s no secret to growth in faith and numbers other than praying, sharing the gospel, and loving those around you.

Keep doing those things and leave the results to God. He loves the churches of the Diocese of Hereford even more than we do, and he knows their future. Eugene Peterson talked about the life of faith as “a long obedience in the same direction.” That is harder than it sounds, and it may not make headlines, but it’s what bears fruit that lasts. We may feel small, weak, and often fragile, but we are held in the hands of a powerful God.

So as we face the future, which is both provisional and certain, both rooted in the past and moving to God’s future, both extremely vulnerable and utterly secure, remember that being weak is a key to strength, doing the old things well is a key to new growth, and patient endurance is a key to a joyful completion of all things in Christ.

May God be with you till we meet again.



You will have probably been wondering why the bells weren't rung for a period over the latter part of last year and this is to forewarn you of the reason that they won't be rung between January through to March. We are pleased to share that these treasured bells are being restored, ensuring their voices will continue to be heard for many years to come.

This important restoration project has been made possible entirely through a generous legacy left by a much-loved church member Derek Crockson, who loved the church very much. Such a gift is far more than financial support; it is a lasting expression of faith, commitment, and love for this place of worship. Through this legacy, we are able to care for one of the most recognisable and cherished features of our church.

Over time, the bells and their supporting mechanisms have been affected by age and regular use. Specialist craftsmen will now carry out careful conservation and repair work, preserving the historic character of the bells while ensuring they can be rung safely and confidently in the future.

This legacy links past, present, and future in a powerful way. Each time the restored bells ring out across Bridgnorth, they will serve as a living reminder of generosity, stewardship, and the enduring life of our church.
