

Darkness and light are often a short hand in our western popular culture for the forces of good and evil. We know instantly in films and television who the heroes and villains are often by the col our of their clothes. So often arguments in our culture are often presented as binary choices between right and wrong, good and bad, left wing or right wing, etc. Just look at the reporting in our news media about world events and you quickly see that we are presented with clear choices rather than any sense of nuance. I was listening on the radio as I prepared to write this, and what was being suggested was that when it comes to political debate most people would prefer nuance to bold binary statements. In many other cultures too, darkness represents evil or hidden unsavoury ac tivities. Alongside this we may find that many of our human fears revolve around darkness and what hides in it. Yet what has struck me recently is that in scripture the idea of darkness is not always so binary. I want to challenge you to look again at what the writers of the bible say and begin to understand darkness with the eyes of faith rather than through the lens of culture. In Psalm 139 the psalmist talks about darkness from God's perspective:

"Even the darkness is not dark to You, And the night is as bright as the day. Darkness and light are alike to You." Psalm 139:12

God does not differentiate light and dark in the way we do, after all he created both of them. We do not live in a 'yin and yang' universe of two equal powers of good and evil or opposing forces of light and dark like a celestial chess set. We don't live in a Star Wars like universe with mystical forces at play that are held in balance with a constant struggle of the dark side and the light side! The bible however does use the ideas of light and dark to differentiate between those who love and follow God and those do not. Isaiah in his prophecy about the coming Messiah reminds them that when God comes to live amongst them then the light of the kingdom will shine on them. The prophet reminds them in a powerful metaphor that the light of the kingdom will dispel and overcome the darkness.

"The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shone." Isaiah 9:2

We should however never equate that with two equal and opposite powers. Instead, it is an analogy which helps us understand that we have choices and God represents the best choices available to us. Many of the New Testament writers talk about the Christian faith as choosing to live in the daylight rather than in the night time. They want the early church to understand that we need to live consistently, transparently and in the open so people can see the difference our faith makes to the way we live our lives. John in the great prologue to his Gospel uses exactly this picture reminding us that God cannot be overwhelmed or swept away by the darkness.

"What came into existence was Life, and the Life was Light to live by. The Life-Light blazed out of the darkness; the darkness couldn't put it out." John 1:5

It reminds us too that even at the very darkest moments of our lives God has not walked away from us, he is not absent, and he stands alongside us. Mat thew in his Gospel recognises this when he records these words from Jesus to his disciples.

"What I tell you in the darkness, speak in the light; and what you hear whispered in your ear, proclaim upon the housetops." Matthew 10:27

Jesus wants the disciples to know that he is with them and alongside them at every stage and he will not turn his back or walk away from us. It is the Holy Spirit given to us at Pentecost who whispers to our hearts and guides us in our daily lives, it is the Spirit who will give us the words to speak when we don't know how to pray. If as you read this because of life's circumstances, you feel trapped in the darkness, remember that God stands in it with you.

Clergy Thoughts

Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth,

of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father,

God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father.

Through him all things were made.

For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven; by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the scriptures;

he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son he is worshipped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

As we look forward to what we probably hope will be a long hot summer, we also enter a new Church season – that of Trinity. It is the longest liturgical period in the year and is also what we call "Ordinary Time." So, there are no special festivals between now and Advent to inspire these clergy thoughts and inspiration needs to be sought elsewhere.

So let's think of a very special anniversary that fell this year, the 1700th anniversary of the first council of Nicaea. The emperor Constantine had recently made Christianity the official religion of the Roman Empire. But already heresies were beginning to creep in, and Constantine wanted a unified church. He summoned all the bishops – 300 of them - to meet and decide on a formula of belief, especially concerning the nature of the Trinity, on which they could all agree, and which would ensure that the church would be cleansed of heresy. Some of the heretic bishops attended but were unable to sway the council. The story goes that the Bishop of Myra – whom we know as St Nicholas – attended and got into an argument with the heretic Arius – and slapped him in the face. The patience of saints? Even saints can lose their cool.

But after all the dispute, the Council came up with a statement of faith, a creed, which has come down to us over those seventeen centuries and which is still the bedrock of today's church – the Nicene Creed. The actual anniversary of the Council was in May, but the Church has now issued a booklet to commemorate the event by taking a close look at that creed. It is called We believe: Exploring the Nicene Creed, and is available from Amazon, or, preferably, direct from Church House Publishing for £3.99. It looks at the creed phrase by phrase, giving thoughts and meditations and Bible references, and aims to deepen understanding of the truths of the creed.

There is not enough space here to look at the creed in detail – though there is a reminder of the wording at the beginning of this article. For more you will need to get the book. But let's just think here of why this creed is so important, 1700 years after it was originally composed.

First, it remains the foundational statement of our beliefs. It does not put forward any special theories but concentrates on the fundamentals. It does name all three persons of the Godhead giving us what the Bible does not, a definition of the Trinity. Contrary to what Arius was saying, the fact that Jesus and the Holy Spirit are just as much God as the Father is a nonnegotiable part of Christianity.

And, with regard to Jesus, the creed puts the incarnation into its historical context making it clear that, though God, he was indeed human. And because of that we can actually know God in Jesus. This is what we believe as Christians!

Then it is important for its provenance – that auspicious Council attended by many great names of the early Church who prayerfully spent so long working out a formula which would be acceptable to all the faithful. And, important too, for the centuries of tradition which followed during which it continued to unite Christians.

Which gives us another reason for its importance – because as Constantine intended it does provide that unity of belief which binds us and keeps us together. Walk into almost any Christian church on a Sunday morning and you will hear it recited in the local language. Whatever our race or colour, we are ONE catholic and apostolic church. And, as it says in the introduction to the booklet, "it unites believers across time and space in a shared confession of who God is and what he has done in Jesus Christ."

All this makes it a very precious part of our heritage. I confess that in my youth, I would often switch off during the reciting of the creed, and perhaps some still do. But I have now come to realise what a gem it truly is and thank God for the wisdom and understanding of the men who put it together. Next time you say it, pray that its truths may be an inspiring presence in your life.

Shropshire Rural Support

Doing nothing is not an option

Shropshire is one of the most beautiful counties in

England from the Teme Valley to the Long Mynd



to the rolling land in the north of the county. The farms that make up and manage this beautiful pastoral scene are run by farmers and their families who are in one of the most stressful and, at times, isolated of occupations with sadly amongst the highest levels of suicide in the UK.

Many of the farms are multigenerational family businesses with up to 3 generations working together on the farm with all the ups and downs of family businesses with the added complication of living on top of each other. Also, not only do they have to put up with vagaries of the weather, but also with continually changing government regulations and the dominance of the supermarkets controlling prices. Some 30 years ago, in a year when suicide incidents peaked in Shropshire, Shropshire Rural Support was set up to support farmers, their families and people living and working in rural Shropshire at times of need. The enquiries we receive cover both business issues and personal issues including bereavement, loneliness, domestic abuse, family fallouts, succession and divorce. Our role is to ensure the caller is signposted to a safe place where they can access the help that they need to address their particular issue, though sometimes it is a case of our being there to listen. We are a selffunding charity run by volunteers, most of whom have a farming background and understand the issues of running a farm. Assisted by the volunteers the day-to-day operation is delivered by 2 part time coordinators.

Shropshire Rural Support continued

The support service is available 24/7/365 via a free phone helpline that ensures that whatever the time-of-day people can readily access our confidential service. For those, particularly the younger generation, who prefer to text message rather than talking on a phone, we have recently launched a free confidential 24/7/365 text messaging helpline.

Doing nothing is not an option, if you know of someone you are worried about, please encourage to them they get in touch by ringing the confidential free phone number 0300 123 2825 or text SRS to 85258.
