Little to report as there has not been a parish council meeting since the April Newsletter. After litter-picking volunteers collected 23 bags of rubbish along the verges of the A458 between Morville & Muckley Cross, contractors carried out the first "Cut & Collect" of our Restore Shropshire Verges Project on 28th March with Mel & Phil Rowley kindly allowing them to dump the cutting on their muck-pile.

The following Sunday, Cllr Pam Yuille called on residents along that stretch of the A458 to find out if they had any concerns about the visual splays from their properties onto the road. Everyone she spoke to was pleased with what had been achieved and said they had been in the habit of cutting their own visual splays as needed and were happy to continue to do so. Volunteers for a further litter pick will be needed before the second "Cut & Collect" at the end of July/beginning of August. Morville School News

Hello from the Morville school family.

The sun is shining down on us today as I write this update whilst I listen to the excited voices of the children in Chestnut Tree Class preparing to leave for their class trip. I think the staff are as excited as the children. The class is off to Tamworth Castle where they will meet a Saxon soldier and will learn about the Saxon hierarchy. They will investigate the different clothes, armour and weapons of trained soldiers compared to peasants. They will then be given a round shield to be taught Saxon defensive tactics such as the impenetrable shield wall. I cannot wait to hear all about it once they are back.

Chestnut Tree Class have been having lots of cultural capital experiences lately including a trip to watch a theatre production of Matilda at Bridgnorth Endowed Secondary School. The children were amazed at the quality performances from children only a few years older than them at the school. It has inspired quite a few of the children and they are already talking about what performances they might like to take part in once they get to secondary school.

Birch Tree Class have been getting their taste buds tingling this week as they have a design technology week exploring Greek food. The children have been learning to explore and evaluate the ingredients that are traditionally included in a Greek salad. They will be moving on to design their own appealing Greek salad for themselves and other users based on design criteria. Finally, they will select and use a range of tools and equipment to prepare, make and eat a traditional Greek salad. I am looking forward to reading their evaluations after, to see what they thought of their sensational salads.

Oak Tree Class have been developing their skills in art this half term by focussing on sculptures. The children have used simple three-dimensional shapes and structures using paper and card. They used folding, rolling and scrunching to create different effects. The children worked collaboratively to plan and create a tree sculpture in the style of the 'Tree of Life' and they have all enjoyed exploring the work of different artists and the sculptures they have created. Many of the children have gone on to use other construction equipment to create further sculptures in class.

This half term a number of pupils came to tell me along with other staff about a wonderful act of spirituality where they have been accessing nature to create their own prayer tree. The children talked about how they had worked together to make the tree before sprinkling daisy and dandelion petals as they shared their prayers. I have now bought a miniature willow tree that is in a pot outside on the playground accessible to all so they can continue this practice even after the grass is cut each fortnight.

PINE MARTEN & DORMICE PROJECT

Morville Parish Council have been able to obtain a grant from the Shropshire Hills National Landscape conservation fund, for us to survey and monitor for the presence of pine martens and dormice in local woodland.

This has been possible because a small part of our parish in and around Weston lies within the boundary of the Shropshire Hills Landscape Trust (previously known as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty).

We have the good fortune to have 2 locally based mammal specialists to lead on the project: Stuart Edmunds, chair of the Shropshire Mammal Group, and licensed dormouse handler Lucy Grove.

The grant will cover the cost of Lucy's and Stuart's time and expertise as well as the purchase of trail cameras, den boxes, dormice tunnels and boxes.

However, we will also need some willing volunteers to help check camera traps and dormouse monitoring equipment!

Letter from the Archdeacon of Ludlow

Dear friends

I seem to live in overlaps and borderlands. What do I mean? Well, our diocese is one that occupies space between Wales and England, criss-crossing the border. We exist in (largely) two counties – Shropshire and Herefordshire (not overlooking our parishes in Monmouthshire, Powys, Worcestershire, and Telford & Wrekin). I live and serve in Shropshire, a county that straddles two dioceses: Hereford in the south and Lichfield in the north.

The Ludlow Archdeaconry is in the overlap, the centre of the Venn diagram.

Then there's my role as Archdeacon. My colleague, Archdeacon Derek, and I minister in the overlap. We represent parishes to those working in the Bishop's Office and the Diocesan Office and vice versa. We provide a link between multiple overlapping groups and individuals.

As Christians we all live in the overlap. We are already saved by grace, we are being saved and sustained by grace, and one day we shall be fully saved by grace when Christ returns. God's kingdom of justice and joy has already begun with Christ's first coming, his death, resurrection, and ascension, and one day it will fully begin at his return. We are citizens of the nation in which we live, and we are citizens of heaven.

We live in the Now and the Not Yet, the time between.

This month marks 80 years since VE Day, Victory in Europe Day, when the evil of Nazism was defeated in Europe. My late mother would tell me stories of how she and her friends, children at the beginning of the war and teenagers at its end, celebrated with overwhelming relief. We remember with thankfulness the courage and sacrifice of all those who served at home and abroad to win the fight for freedom against Nazi tyranny.

But that wasn't the end of the war. In Burma, Singapore, and other places, the war raged on as fiercely and cruelly as ever. VJ Day, in August 1945, finally brought hostilities to an end. The troops still fighting between May and August, and their families, often felt overlooked in the celebrations of VE Day. They were existing in the overlap.

This season of the Church's year is the time in between. We are between Easter Day and Pentecost. We have celebrated the joy of the resurrection, and we await the celebration of the coming of the Holy Spirit in power to set the Church alight in love and witness.

I wonder how that idea of living in the overlap, grounded in the past and moving to the future, knowing that we and all our times are held in the hands of our unchanging and faithful God, could help us as we continue on our pilgrimage?
