Dear friends

We're three-quarters of the way through our Year of Faith, which seems like a good point to pause and reflect. Building on last year's Year of Prayer, we've been encouraged throughout the year to develop our confidence in our faith, and in the fact that people are actually hungry to hear the stories of our faith and what it means to us.

Of course, by the grace of God we'll carry on growing in faith and confidence as we go into 2025, just as we've carried on growing in prayer in 2024.

But what is faith, really? I reflected on this with Churchwardens at the Visitations in the Ludlow Archdeaconry in the summer. Faith isn't believing six impossible things before breakfast. Faith doesn't require us to remove our brains as we enter church, leaving them in a box ready to collect on our way out of church and back into our everyday lives. Faith isn't a vague nebulous matter – faith has to be in something or someone.

Faith is, according to the writer of the letter to the Hebrews, "being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see." There's a paradoxical firmness in that. We can't physically see the outcome of the promises we receive by faith, but we can have an unshakeable conviction that they are true, and that what we now receive by faith we shall one day know by sight.

We can be so certain because we know and trust the one in whom our faith is placed. We know God's character and faithfulness. We know, as the well-loved hymn puts it, "As Thou hast been, Thou forever wilt be." God has proved it time and again in the pages of Scripture, in the life, death, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus, and in our own lives.

When we know the one in whom our faith is placed, we know our faith is not in vain. When my children were young, my very adventurous daughter climbed the tree in our back garden. She got stuck. She was only two, and she became scared. She called to me for help, but first on the scene was her older brother, aged four. "Don't worry," he soothed his frightened sister. "I'm here. I'll help get you down." My

daughter paused momentarily from her crying and then resumed her loud pleas for help. Not because she didn't trust her brother, but because she knew he didn't have the height or the strength to deliver on his well-meaning promise. Only when I rushed down the garden did she begin to calm down, because she knew I could actually help.

Our faith is not in vain because we know the one in whom we have trusted. We know that he is at work in the seen and in the unseen, and that he is at work building his Church whether we shall ever live to see that time of growth and harvest or not.

So let's keep telling one another and those we meet day-by-day the stories of faith, and of the utter reliability and certainty of the gospel and of the God who makes it all possible. For faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not [yet] see.

RIDE+STRIDE – 14 Sept 2024

Ride+Stride is a chance for YOU to raise money for your Church.

Anyone can join in - collect **sponsors**, then plan your own route - walk, bike, **or car** - visit some churches - enjoy the day.

The **sponsorship money is split 50/50 between your local Church** and the Shropshire Historic Churches Trust (SHCT), which uses it to award grants for repairs and improvements to our Churches and Chapels.

So 100% goes to our Churches. This is definitely a '**Good Thing**'.

'Ride+Stride' is a National event by the National Churches Trust and we, at SHCT, are pleased to support it. The basic idea is twofold:

(1) Churches try to be open for visitors on Saturday 14 Sept from about 10 to 6, ideally with light refreshments (biscuits, squash; cake maybe).

(2) Anyone can visit as few or as many churches as you wish.

Go anywhere ... on foot, by bike, **or by car**, using our Sponsorship Form to collect sponsorship for your church and for the Trust

R+S is **NOT** an event where church visits are centrally organised. The Trust does **not** have a 'central team' that plans any walking, cycling, or car rides.

NO ... It's something that Churches do for themselves.

September may seem like a long way away, but time flies. You can get a **Sponsorship Form** from our website **www.shropshirehct.org.uk**

Or contact me and I will get one to you. You can still go and visit other churches, even if your own church is closed (builders, lack of staff, etc).

The next 'R+S Day' is Saturday 14th Sept. **But** if you can't manage that date **then you can go on on any other day** – which is what a lot of people do.

It is important to maintain or increase the visiting aspect otherwise the event will cease. The county raised £37,082 last year, so we, the Trust, are encouraging it to continue - even in parts of the county where it has fallen 'off the radar' and, at present, there are few visitors to the open churches.

This event has much more potential ... For example, Dorset raised £98,000. This is 260% more than us, and it has a similar population to Shropshire. Well, actually 30% more, but raising so much for their churches is amazing.

Thank you to everyone who helped in previous years. We (you) raised a record amount last year. Congratulations. We are progressing well.

I hope you can participate this year. Help preserve our Churches in good repair; and help to keep them open for the future.

The Worshipful Company of Somebodies – an Appreciation

Picture a rural church, your local church or one you visit occasionally, on an Autumnal Sunday morning. A chill in the still air and a weak sun as you approach the open porch door. Lights on inside and a hint of warmth as you enter. Someone looks up and smiles, “Welcome, I’ve not seen you in a while. Keeping well?” They hand you a hymn book, order of service and pew sheet and you move on in to where you like to sit, pausing to say hello to an old acquaintance on the way. At the appointed hour the congregation, small in number, but expectant, go silent. A member of the clergy walks down the nave aisle and all stand. The service is familiar, the prayers thoughtful, the hymns include one or two old favourites and the sermon hits the right note. It even throws a new perspective on one of the readings that you would not have considered. As it concludes you think about whether to stay for a coffee and chat. Refreshed, set up for the week ahead, you head out into the sunshine and to Sunday lunch.

The Worshipful Company of Somebodies have been, and still are, busy. Somebody planned the rota and circulated it to those taking part in the service. Somebody collected the pew sheets. Somebody set out the service register. Somebody sometimes sets out the baptism register and brings in a small gift and candle for the child or adult to be baptised. Two somebodies practised the readings and another pondered the events and news, both local and national to bring them together in the intercessions. The clergy person prepared the service and the sermon. Somebody chose the hymns and put up the numbers on the hymn board. Somebody came in the day before and set out the vestments and the wine, chalice and

other necessary items on the credence table and altar. Somebody arranged the flowers where they could best be seen. Somebody unlocked the church and vestry, switched on the water heater and made sure the heating was on. Somebody cleaned the toilet. Somebody put out a glass of water for the clergy. Somebody checked which order of service was required and set out what was needed for those attending the service. Somebody cleared the steps of leaves and removed fallen twigs from the path. Somebody lit the candles and made a note to get some more in. Somebody checked on wafer and wine supplies. Somebody put the kettle on, set out coffee cups and brought the milk. Somebody washes up the cups, wipes them and puts them away. Somebody has brought biscuits. Somebody has left Crosslink bundles at the back of church for collection. Somebody put up a notice about services on the boards outside and picked up litter from the car park and churchyard. Somebody mentioned that a member of the congregation was not well and asked for them to be remembered in our prayers. Somebody will unlock and lock up the church during the week.

Some of the somebodies have a title: sidesman, sacristan, vicar, organist, but there is a small army of somebodies who are just members of the worshipping community who love their church.

A couple of hours later the service is over, the coffee mugs washed and put away and the church door closed. The smell of the candles and the wine lingers for a few hours more, as the warmth slowly drains and the stones settle to their silent role of maintaining the balance between inside and out.

So next time you attend church, just say a quiet thank you for the Worshipful Company of Somebodies and if you are already a member of the Company, give yourself a little pat on the back!

If you read the accompanying poem 'Questions', on page 10 you may reflect as I did at the time, what an unsatisfactory answer the above would have been to my young daughter's questions whilst we were on a nature-study walk one summer, many years ago.

The bird in question was larger than a sparrow and not yet fully fledged. I considered some answer framed around 'survival of the fittest' but it seemed almost that heaven cancelled what for so young a child, would have been a cold scientific answer.

Early and untimely death; and why does God allow it to happen: Subsequently, and much later in my ministry of evangelism, especially in Christian enquiry courses, it was one of those 'brick wall' questions which I found (and still find) difficult to answer: mainly because it is something which I still struggle with in my own prayers – especially when it is scaled up to tragedies on a human level.

God's will and His judgement can be sudden and untimely; rather like the thunderstorm which cut short our enjoyable walk.

Amen.

Season of Mists and Mellow Fruitfulness

So summer is fading and autumn beckons – and that means harvest festivals.

There must have been harvest celebrations and thanksgivings since humanity first discovered farming. Some civilisations had several a year, marking grape, olive and wheat harvests. The Jews' main harvest festival was Succoth, but they also celebrated the festival of the First Fruits at Shavuot. This also marked the giving of the Torah – the law - and fell fifty days after the Passover and gives us our Pentecost.

In Britain, there was Lammas –or Loaf Mass, - the wheat harvest on 1st August which fell out of favour after the Reformation, superseded by what we now think of as the traditional harvest festival on the Sunday nearest to the Harvest Moon in September. It was a community event and celebrations would end with the Harvest Supper or “Churn Supper,” named after the big jug of cream provided, on Michaelmas Eve. It was a thank you from the farmer to his workers for their toil over the year.

But the tradition of celebrating Harvest Festival in church, as we know it today, only began in 1843 when Reverend Robert Hawker invited his parishioners at Morwenstow in Cornwall to come to the church for a special thanksgiving service. Victorian hymn writers latched on to the idea, providing us with the harvest standards, “We plough the fields and scatter,” “Come, ye thankful people, come,” and the ubiquitous “All Things Bright and Beautiful.” These hymns and the practice of decorating the churches with locally grown produce all served to popularize Hawker’s idea and it has now, of course, become an unmissable part of the church calendar.

For us, the connection between the people and the land has become more tenuous since those Victorian beginnings, as the population became increasingly urbanized, and a much smaller proportion of our food was locally produced. But just as much as ever, the harvest is an opportunity for thanksgiving and generosity. We can offer thanksgiving for God’s provision and for our good fortune in sharing in it; and generosity, as we remember those less fortunate. In much of the world, there are still subsistence farmers who are totally dependent on the success of the harvest and who often barely survive; we can support them by giving to aid organizations seeking to relieve famine. And of course, much closer to home, we can support the work of the Food Bank and help those in our own community who lack the basic necessities of life. And we continue to pray - accept the gifts we offer, for all thy love imparts, [and] what thou most desirest, our humble, thankful hearts.

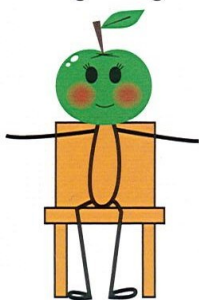
